

### **Darkness No Darkness** Released by American Church Union




The American Church Union is pleased to announce a new publication, *Darkness No Darkness*, by Raymond Raynes (first published by Faith Press, 1958). Father Raynes (1903-1958), late Superior of the Anglican Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield, England, has influenced many of us in the United States as well as in England and South Africa. This short work of retreat meditations, republished with permission of the Community of the Resurrection, follows the ACU's publication of *The Life of Raymond Raynes* by Nicholas Mosley in 2013 and *The Faith* by Raymond Raynes in 2012.



## St Joseph of Arimathea's Online Courses for Fall, 2014

Our Province's seminary, St Joseph of Arimathea Anglican Theological College, will again offer online lecture courses on weekday evenings for interested clergy and laity.

The two courses offered this fall are **A Historical Survey of The Church of England** and **The Gospel of Saint John**. These courses are targeted to specific audiences, but anyone with a desire to learn more of their subjects may take them. The Anglican history course will help postulants prepare for the questions they are likely to receive in this area of their canonical exam. The Scripture course should give preachers new ideas for sermons, as it will deepen their understanding of the pericopes we have in our lectionary from the Fourth Gospel.

A Historical Survey of The Church of England will be taught by The Rev. Jeffrey Smith, St Luke's Anglican Church, Redding, California, on Tuesdays, 6-7 p.m. (Pacific Time) beginning September 16 and ending November 25.

The Gospel of Saint John will be taught by The Rev. Dr. Paul Russell, The Parish of Christ the King, Washington, D.C., on Thursdays, 6-7 p.m. (Pacific Time) beginning September 11 and ending November 20.

Each class may be viewed at the time of broadcast or later in recorded form and on either a computer screen or a mobile device. The fee for those taking A Historical Survey of The Church of England with written assignments is \$200. The fee to audit either course is \$50.

*Chapel:* This word has a highly romantic origin. It is associated with the story of St. Martin's sharing his cloak with a beggar. "Cloak," in late Latin, is *cappella*, a little cloak, or cape, from *cappa*, cloak, cape, cope. The Frankish kings preserved St. Martin's cloak as a sacred relic. ... It was preserved in a sanctuary, under the care of special ministers called *cappellani*, or chaplains, and from the ministers the name came to be attached to the building.
